30 accountability of those expenses with receipts, it is not being fiscally responsible to the citizens
31 of the City of Onalaska and the taxpayers. Each and every department head and employee is
32 required to submit receipts for any and all expenses incurred while doing business for the City of
33 Onalaska. Again, is this required for the Mayor’s position? And will it be required for the new
34 position coming up? I would respectfully request this to be brought through the Finance and
35 Personnel Committee with discussion and answers to the taxpayers of the City of Onalaska.

251 **The following item was pulled from the Consent Agenda, to be addressed at this time in the**
252 **Non-Consent Agenda.**

253
254 B. Approval of the Onalaska Veterans Memorial Perpetual Care Agreement to be adjusted
255 from \$400 to \$450 per year for 2016.

256
257 Ald. Muth said, "I really feel that the memorial up there is the City of Onalaska's. I feel it's the
258 cemetery's. I think it belongs to all the citizens. I don't think it just belongs to the American
259 Legion even though they're the ones that built it, as I understand it, at no cost whatsoever to the
260 City of Onalaska. I think that it represents all citizens in Onalaska. It shouldn't just represent
261 the American Legion or post. Our post does a tremendous amount of work for this community,
262 and I just cannot see why we cannot back our community by paying that \$400 or \$450, which
263 pays for the electricity for the light overnight and the maintenance and the mowing. To me, it's
264 such a small dollar amount. I've read the initial contract that the American Legion Post 336 has
265 with the city, and I believe it's from 2005 and not 2008. I went over it with Jarrod, [who]
266 brought up the possibility of raising it \$50. Deep in my heart, I honestly believe this is
267 something the city should pay, and it shouldn't be something the American Legion pays. That
268 memorial is everybody's. It represents every veteran in the City of Onalaska, some which gave
269 their life. It's their recognition. I just don't think it should be the Legion's responsibility to pay
270 for that maintenance. I think it should be the city's responsibility."

271
272 Ald. Binash said, "I happen to agree with Bob with the issue that veterans being memorialized at
273 the city cemetery. I know Bob being a combat veteran himself [and] myself and several others
274 here who are also veterans, it still is a separate entity from the city. We might have to give some
275 consideration to paying something towards at least the electricity or something. I would like it to
276 be that the American Legion didn't have to pay anything, but I still think it's a separate entity
277 from the city. Unless the citizens were to come forth and say something specifically that we
278 should not have the American Legion pay for any upkeep, I think the American Legion is going
279 to be responsible for something."

280
281 Ald. Bialecki noted that the original contract had come "into light" in August 2005 and said it
282 contained a significant amount of criteria, including the city determining the potential cost of
283 utilities and maintenance. At that time, the agreement was for \$400 a year. Ald. Bialecki noted
284 he had reviewed the agreement at the request of another veteran and said it also specified that the
285 agreement should be reviewed on a triannual basis. Ald. Bialecki pointed out that "it hasn't been
286 touched in over 10 years until recently" and said that "neither side has budged on that until this
287 came up." Ald. Bialecki then asked Jarrod to provide a cost estimation.

288
289 Jarrod said city staff performs the maintenance at the Onalaska Veterans Memorial and noted
290 that the city's cost to have the light for the flag is \$262. Jarrod estimated the cost of having a
291 part-time employee trim the grass once a week at \$165. Jarrod also estimated that a supervisor
292 would spend two hours at the memorial. The total cost would be approximately \$500 a year, and

293 Jarrod said, “The [costs] that are directly attributable that the city has to pay out of pocket is
294 \$262. The rest of it is staff time that’s put toward it.”
295

296 Ald. Bialecki stated that he respects Ald. Muth’s opinion and noted there are veterans – some of
297 whom have seen combat – present this evening. However, Ald. Bialecki also said he agrees with
298 Ald. Binash in that “they’re two separate entities. We are in an agreement, and I don’t know that
299 I can waive that. I would feel differently if the philosophy was that that was part of the whole
300 city cemetery [and] we should take care of that. I might be open to that, and that’s with the
301 understanding if you’re going to maintain that, any and all funds related to that project now go to
302 the jurisdiction of the city.” Ald. Bialecki also noted that the American Legion Post 336’s
303 Executive Board had met Monday evening and no one had raised any objections to the \$50
304 increase.
305

306 Ald. Muth said the cost should not have been \$450 10 years ago and noted that the American
307 Legion has been paying \$400 a year since 2005. Ald. Muth said, “It couldn’t have cost that
308 amount of money to maintain the electricity and the maintenance if it costs that now in today’s
309 dollars 10 years later. I think the American Legion has been overpaying a number of years prior
310 to now, if that’s correct.”
311

312 Jarrod said, “We’re trying to be relatively fair with the numbers we’re using. If you used a full-
313 time employee it would probably go up another \$200. I wasn’t involved with the original
314 calculation on how we ascertained the original \$400 amount, but it all depends on what you
315 throw into what is care of the memorial? Do we water the memorial? ... You could cost yourself
316 to death with what you would be putting into the estimate. These were costs I thought were
317 directly attributable for sure to the memorial just to present.”
318

319 Ald. Muth referred to an instance in the summer of 2015 where three workers were watching
320 another dig a hole at 3rd and State streets and said, “I imagine I was standing there as a taxpayer
321 wondering how much money it would cost to dig the hole while three guys with white helmets
322 watched him. A supervisor [and] additional costs for them maintaining that ... I’m sorry, [but] I
323 don’t buy it. I don’t go along with increasing the amount at all.”
324

325 Ald. Binash said, “I can certainly appreciate what Bob is saying, but this is a contract. It’s a
326 contract with the city and American Legion, and I think we have to reach an agreement with the
327 Legion. I know that it’s been discussed there as being a member of Post 336, but the contract
328 says \$400 annually to be reviewed on a triennial basis. It is a memorial to the city as well
329 because there are people there who were from this particular area and who have bricks and their
330 names on it. Four hundred dollars to me, under the circumstances ... This is a memorial to the
331 city. This is a contract. I don’t see any reason to change it.”
332

333 Ald. Bertrand asked Ald. Binash if he believes the yearly fee should remain \$400.
334

335 Ald. Binash said yes.

336

337 Motion by Ald. Binash, second by Ald. Bialecki, to approve maintaining the \$400 yearly fee for
338 the Onalaska Veterans Memorial Perpetual Care Agreement for 2016.

339

340 Ald. Olson asked, “Would you like to place a date when it’s renewable?”

341

342 Ald. Bialecki said, “All we looked at is the amount. There were no changes to the existing
343 agreement. My point is I think if we just review this right now of record, somebody will look at
344 that in three years’ time. That’s what the existing agreement says.”

345

346 On voice vote, motion carried, 5-1 [Ald. Muth].

347

348 **Item 8 – JUDICIARY COMMITTEE**

353

354 Motion by Ald. Blomquist, second by Ald. Bialecki, to approve Ordinance No. 1525-2016 – to
355 create Chapter 3 of Title 2, Section 14 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Onalaska relating
356 to City Administrator (Third and Final Reading).

357

358 Cari said she would like to note the following suggested changes, which had been reviewed by
359 Sean:

360

- 361 • Under (e) (“Organizational Level”), there had been a suggestion to delete “the Mayor’s
362 executive authority.” Cari said this had been retained per Sean’s recommendation.
- 363 • Under (f)(1) (“Specific Duties”), there had been a suggestion to delete the second comma
364 on the first line.
- 365 • Under (f)(12) (“Specific Duties”), there had been a suggestion to delete the second
366 comma. However, this comma was retained.
- 367 • Under (f)(15) (“Specific Duties”), the word “perform” was changed to “performs.”

368

369 Sean addressed (e) (“Organizational Level”) and said the phrase “is delegated the Mayor’s
370 executive authority” must be included in the ordinance “in order to take the certain statutory
371 authority of the Mayor, which is delegable to a third party – in this case, the City Administrator –
372 and actually does that. If the language ‘is delegated the Mayor’s executive authority’ is
373 removed, then the Mayor will retain the statutory authority even though your ordinance says that
374 the [City] Administrator has the authority. The [City] Administrator in fact will not have the
375 authority because there has to be a specific delegation of that authority. I’m recommending you

376 keep that in because these are the most magic words in this particular ordinance.”

377

378 Sean addressed the two commas that had been suggested to be deleted and noted that they both
379 are commas at the end of subordinate clauses. Sean said, “If we’re going to remove those
380 commas we also have to remove the first comma. It’s the preferred method by almost every
381 stylebook that you put both commas in. It’s acceptable to have neither of the commas. Taking
382 the second comma out changes the meaning of the sentence. You can have two, or you can have
383 zero. You can’t have one.”

384

385 On voice vote, motion carried.

386

409 Katie deferred to Sean on this item.

410

411 Sean said, “In connection with resolving the issues that have arisen by the Town of Onalaska
412 filing a Petition for Incorporation for all of the town into a new entity named the Village of
413 Midway, there’s been an agreement in principle arrived at between the City of Onalaska, the
414 Village of Holmen and the Town of Onalaska regarding future boundaries over the next 10 years.
415 As part of that agreement, the Petition for Incorporation would be withdrawn. Annexations
416 could begin again, and it would set the stage for at least the next 10 years. As part of this
417 process, because there’s an agreement in principle and it’s not a final agreement, you’re being

418 asked to pass a resolution to allow the negotiations to continue forward, number one. Number
419 two, to allow a public hearing to be noticed. We're anticipating the public hearing is going to be
420 February 29, but we haven't confirmed that yet. [There will be] a joint hearing among the city
421 Plan Commission and the Town of Onalaska Plan Commission and the Village of Holmen Plan
422 Commission, at which a final agreement would be reviewed and then also reviewed by the public
423 in order to take public comment. If the agreement is in final form at that time and the public is in
424 support of it, then we would hope to approve the final agreement in March at the March [8
425 Common] Council meeting."

426

427 Motion by Ald. Bialecki, second by Ald. Olson, to approve Resolution 5-2016 – Authorizing
428 Preparation of General Boundary Agreement Between the City of Onalaska, Village of Holmen
429 and Town of Onalaska.

430
